THE CASTLE HOTEL

Looking at the Castle Hotel in Bramber, one gets the impression of a comfortable Victorian railway hotel, and so it was, but it has a long history.

Going back to the time of Henry VIII there were two inns in Bramber, one of which was the White Lion. In 1526 the Lion was 'dispensing alcoholic refreshment' but it may have been established much earlier. Bramber has been associated with the de Braose, de Mowbray and Howard families in the past, and all had a lion featured on their coat of arms, so there might have been a Lion Inn in Bramber since Norman times.

In 1552 there were two inns in Bramber, one of which was the White Lion, when the County Coroner met with 14 jurors at Bramber Court to conduct an inquest into a dispute between the two innkeepers, William Battner and Widow Christian Kayne, over local grazing lands. The Court heard that on 28th October 1551, Christian Kayne's pigs entered William Battner's land, grazing and causing damage. Battner's son John took the his father's dogs to drive the pigs away. Joan Davyd, Kayne's servant, saw what was happening, rushed over and 'fought John and beat the dogs away from the pigs'. Then William Battner, seeing Joan on his land attacking his son went over and struck her with his hand. Joan 'died a natural death in Christian's house', the verdict being reached when it was concluded that she had been weakened some time previously by 'black jaundice' and that the blow was not the cause of her demise.

The inn survived and prospered. In 1624 the accommodation could sleep 14 or more people, but by 1736 it had expanded and could sleep '20 people in comfort.' In 1636 it was owned by Richard Meade who owned 5 other taverns in Sussex, an earlier version of Wetherspoons perhaps!

In 1841 the landlord of the inn was James Potter, the father of Walter Potter who founded Potter's Museum in Bramber.

With the arrival of the railway in 1861 and the tourists who came from Brighton, Worthing and elsewhere to visit Bramber Castle, major rebuilding of the inn took place, and the White Lion became the Castle Hotel, thought to sound a little more 'gentrified'.

During the late 19th and early 20th century Bramber Castle and its grounds were usually let to the landlord of the Castle Hotel who would have made a profit from the entrance fees and selling refreshments.

A walk today round the Castle moat can still reveal pieces of broken bottles that were thrown over the walls by visitors in times past!
