Exhibition news - Rachael Rainbow

In June we'll be launching our new exhibition *Bunker* as part of our 80th anniversary of VE Day programme. Back in May 1945, the country celebrated VE Day and the end of the Second World War in Europe. But the peace that followed was soon clouded by new tensions and the long shadow of the Cold War. Our new exhibition, *Bunker*, looks at how people prepared and protected themselves in both these uncertain times. From local air raid shelters to Cold War bunkers, it's a fascinating glimpse into how our communities stayed safe, stayed strong, and stood ready—even underground!

News from the Collections team – Margaret Benham



Nigel Alan Dow, one of the Museum's late members and a steward, died on 10.04.2023. In February 2024 the Museum was informed that Nigel Alan Dow (known as 'Alan') had left the Museum a pecuniary (cash) legacy and a specific legacy under his will. Nigel was a professional engraver of mainly vignettes and portraits who had devoted his career to designing and creating metal engraved plates mainly for bank notes and stamps for his employer's national and international clients. These clients included the Bank of England, for whom he created engravings of the head of Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II for UK bank notes. He also created engravings of historical and international figures, heads of state including the King of Qatar and several other notable personages, royal and otherwise for use on bank notes and stamps.

Nigel's legacy to the Museum included all his collection of engraving equipment, engraved plates and several examples of the bank notes and postage stamps that he had designed and produced over the years. Whilst Nigel had lived in Steyning for several years before he died, his work was not connected with Steyning or the locality and he had never worked here. Therefore, the Trustees decided that the objects comprised in Nigel's legacy were outside the Museum's Collections Development Policy and accordingly, (apart from a few of Nigel's personal possessions, a couple of examples of his work and some photographs

of him at work) should not be accessioned and would be disposed of by sale. The terms of Nigel's legacy permitted such a sale for the benefit of the Museum.

The Trustees obtained expert valuations and instructed Toovey's auctioneers to sell Nigel's collection. The sale of these objects has raised a total of £118,898.84 (gross proceeds of £136,652.40 less auction costs of £17,753.56) for the Museum's funds. The proceeds of the final sale were received in February 2025. In addition, the Museum received the pecuniary legacy of £5000.00 under Nigel's will. The Trustees are very grateful for this extremely generous gift. Rachael, the Museum's Curator of Exhibitions, has agreed to consider creating a temporary exhibition devoted to Nigel and his work, possibly combined with the history of banking in Steyning, the Anglo-Saxon Steyning Mint and the use of coins and tokens in Steyning and the area. However, this is unlikely to be possible until 2026 due to the Exhibitions' team's tight schedule for 2025.


A Courtyard in Steyning

In a recent newsletter we asked people to look out for any connections to Steyning whilst on holiday in foreign parts. Shirley Blomfield, a museum volunteer who works on our Modes Database, was recently on holiday in New Zealand and found a reference to an undated watercolour painting on display in the

Christchurch Art Gallery Te Puna o Waiwhetu entitled 'A Courtyard in Steyning' by the artist Edith Blanche Blunt.

At first it was assumed to be of the yard behind the Chequer pub but looking closely at the picture through the open doorway on the left it appeared to show meat carcases hanging up in a butcher's shop. The Chequer yard was visited, as well as the yard behind the now closed Cancer Research shop, but neither building matched the picture. When in doubt always ask the Oracle and Chris Todd identified it as the entrance between the Post Office and the shop next door.

The next thing was to identify the artist. Had she lived in Steyning? Edith Blanche Blunt, nee Wilkinson, was born in 1864 in Great Ouseburn, Yorkshire. In 1896 she married Thomas Gaire Rockstro Blunt, a school master and, together with their baby son, they emigrated to New Zealand in 1901, where they lived in the Christchurch area.



Edith returned to England in 1919, travelling alone, her eldest son Brian was a student in London at the time. There is another painting in the Christchurch Art Gallery depicting St Michael's Mount in Cornwall dated ca 1920. Did she come to Steyning during her visit to England and paint the courtyard? She was then an established painter in New Zealand exhibiting at the Canterbury Society of Arts between 1904 and 1933 and at the New Zealand Academy of Fine Arts between 1919 and 1933.

In 1931 Edith was living with her husband, now a professor, in Christchurch, but by 1932 she was living at 22 High Street, Steyning on her own. By 1933 she had moved to 30 Church Street before settling at 10 Highland Croft where she lived until her death in 1946.

Attention cricket fans:

Edith's second son Roger Charles Blunt MBE was a famous cricketer playing in 9 test matches until 1930 when he moved to England and became a BBC commentator. He was Cricketer of the Year in 1928, awarded the Queen Elizabeth Coronation Medal in 1953 and in 1965 awarded the MBE.
